worked hard at preparations and deliveries, as well as preparing art projects and a mural for the children of La Gonave.

The Tranquility and crew Conch Republic Navy boats delivering over 25 a “flotilla” approach to Tranquility became a Republic Navy, flying solo to their destination Volunteers from several coordination, voice and weather reports and non-governmental



were part of the Key West (CRN) effort, with multiple tons of needed supplies in separate destinations. SV “flagged” vessel in the Conch their CRN flag, and sailing in the final “wave” of boat. organizations, provided email communications, contact with the local Haiti organizations. Goals include

developing sustaining infrastructures for the local communities, while in the short term providing immediate relief. On the ground surveys by two CRN vessels, Tranquility and Haitus will assist with follow-on efforts in Haiti.

Coordination of this humanitarian effort reached many parts of the globe - from Cameron’s father Mark Edwards-Murray in Hawaii, to Bridgeport San Diego where the shoes were painted and shipped to Miami, to deliveries of equipment and supplies in Miami, to Egypt - where Joanne and Fouad Tawfilis founders of Art Miles Mural Project and Shoes of Hope are directing shoe deliveries from Egypt, Joan - aka “Eye in the Sky” - who coordinated the significant logistics and weather coordinates etc..., Endangered Planet Foundation founder Charles Michael Murray in Laguna Beach to other brother Scott V. Murray producing banners and flags for the trip (yes - three brothers, and a total of seven Murray’s involved...) et al... and special recognition to the human spirit of collaboration for humanity...

“The wind is clocking around so we are about to set sail. We will have this for a few hours then wind will die and have to motor for a few hours as the wind shift comes thru.”....

So go the words of Captain Cameron Murray...en route to Haiti and sailing past a weather front that kept them anchored and delayed by a day or so...I imagine Maya the Mermaid there...a little woozy from the rough and choppy seas, and Fynn, the little brother, but big man on board preparing for an engineering debut in Haiti. In fact, he just might be the youngest engineer headed that way and at least the only one on board a yacht packed with Aid to Haiti....According to his Mother, Leighia...

“Fynn is our scientist and is excited to let off his rocket to show the kids some aerodynamics, he has plenty of construction paper onboard and is going to take that in to teach them how to make flying planes, he too is a very expressive little man, and loves to learn how things work, and come apart (he has his own electrical box and tools) and I have no working clocks left onboard.”

As I sat here thinking about what to write and I could almost see Fynn on the yacht “Tranquility”, tool box in hand gazing out onto the ocean and the likely incredible horizon of both dawn and dusk, and what goes through my mind at this moment, is how great it is to know that this young 7 year old boy is already on the “high seas” ready to go “fix something”! What he is about to experience, aside from the journey aboard ship itself, will be something that will be imprinted on his heart forever...but that will have to wait for another story...maybe from his own words...



His grandfather commented in an email that what they (we) are doing is only a speck of what is needed there...the CNN special on trafficking of children of Haiti rattled him...but for those of us who have seen the wrath and aftermath of destruction by natural and human disaster, we already know that all we can do is try to make a difference. 1,400 pairs of Art Miles Shoes of Hope for Haiti boxed into containers on Tranquility are not as big as Fynn’s toolbox or the suitcase full of shoes Dr. Marty Rosenstein will take to South Africa in a few weeks...but what is more important is the hearts full of concern and care, and the idea of going someplace to help someone that will make a huge difference in their lives.

The thought of Ally Woodard, our 9 year old AMMP Shoes of Hope Ambassador gathering shoes and crocs for Haiti and also sending off shoes to the Philippines, Mexico and now South Africa seems like a giant cinemascope movie that certainly deserves an Oscar...the real award winner actors in life...

We are so lucky...to be able to put people together to help people together...so thank you Fynn and the Wind and the Shoes and the Ship and warm thoughts and soothing messages to Haiti and South Africa...

Thank you all for all you do, each of you...and Leighia, the only clock you really need on board is the one that tells you that your time and Captain Cameron’s time is so well spent on the two young treasures you have on board named Maya and Fynn!

In another location, not too far from the Florida coast where the Tranquility lifted anchor and headed across the seas, is another young lady whose name is “Ally” who is also busy sketching her ideas and thoughts onto Art Miles Shoes of Hope and how to get more, do more, send more, bring more. She traveled around the world this past summer creating and delivering shoes to orphans in yet another part of the world in the Philippines. (It was there she met another water bound family in Hong Kong, the Begbie family who collect and distribute barely used and new goods to people in need all over the world).

Still yet, in the glamorous city of Los Angeles, another girl-woman actress/activist, by the name of Tanna Frederick will be running this weekend in support of a mental hospital in mid America’s state of Iowa, as she prepares for the Boston Marathon and later this summer, for the Save Our Surf Marathon where she and other surfing celebrities are doing something that is also involving the treasured commodity we all need to survive...WATER.

For Immediate Release: Art Miles Shoes of Hope Set Sail to Haiti

The Art Miles Shoes of Hope Project once again has sparked a remarkable “Sail Aid to Haiti” event in collaboration with Volunteer San Diego, Bridgepoint Education, Inc., Vista Middle School, the Endangered Planet Foundation and the sailing vessel “Tranquility” from TransMarine in Miami, Florida.

Inspired by the Art Miles Shoes of Hope, Volunteer San Diego and in partnership with Bridgepoint Education, employees and families painted 1,400 pairs of Art Miles Shoes of Hope to orphans in coastline village survivors of Haiti’s devastating earthquake. Vista Magnet Middle School and other Art Miles team members provided the other 600 pairs.

The painted shoes were picked up and will be delivered by the “Tranquility” directly to an orphanage along with medical supplies and food. This first shipment, will serve as a test run by the ship and other donors for consecutive drops of aid to Haiti. The voyage will be led by Captain Cameron Murray and First Mate, Leighia Murray, an outstanding young couple and parents of two children of their own, and who, despite their own involvement as busy young entrepreneurs and teachers, have passionately and generously responded to the need for “Aid” by land, by air and for them, by sea. It is their dedication and determinations that will ensure the shoes get through some rough seas to their final destination and onto the feet of the children.

Bridgepoint Education hosted a two-day shoe decoration project at their Kearny Mesa location on February 24 and their Sabre Springs location on February 25. Approximately 1400 employees participated in the project.


